Models of Survivorship Care



- Type of survivor.

Models of Survivorship Care



- Emerging models may be limited in light of the needs of diverse and underserved populations.
- Models could be expanded to address disparities in survivorship outcomes.
 - Guided by social and cultural context.



Expanded Models of Survivorship Care



- Type of survivor.
 - How are the needs of co-survivors (family members, caregivers) addressed?
- Setting of care.
 - Community-based settings in addition to healthcare settings.



Expanded Models of Survivorship Care

A Cancer Center Designated by the



- Type of clinician providing care.
 - Are survivors part of the care team?
 - In communities in which cancer knowledge is low and cancer stigma is high, survivors can...
 - Serve as role models/mentors/coaches.
 - Normalize the experience and reduce isolation.
 - Serve as unique sources of support due to shared experience.
- Purpose of survivorship care program.
 - Point of service for targeted interventions.

Intervention Development in **Karmanos** Survivorship Care



- Community engagement.
 - Time- and labor-intensive.
- Cultural leverage.
 - A focused strategy for improving the health of racial and ethnic communities by using their cultural practices, products, philosophies, or environments as vehicles that facilitate behavior change of patients and practitioners.

Next Steps



- It is challenging to establish evidence-based interventions as part of standard care in survivorship care settings.
- Extending reach beyond the traditional survivorship care setting.
 - SEER and state registries.
 - Partnerships with existing cancer advocacy groups.
 - eHealth/mHealth-based dissemination.

- Breast cancer is over-represented in behavioral survivorship research.
- There is a tremendous need for work focused on other types of cancer survivors across diverse populations.
